



Legal Update (2 hours)

The most dangerous phrase in law enforcement is "that's the way we've always done it." Recent national events have placed intense scrutiny on police officers. It is no longer good enough to have a basic understanding of the law. Police officers must know the law like a lawyer. Failure to have a solid a grasp of the law exposes officers and their public employers to costly and harmful lawsuits. New Mexico legal update is designed to educate law enforcement and administrators on the most important changes in the law that effect policing. This NMDPS approved course also serves to meet New Mexico's biennium training requirement for all New Mexico certified officers. However, this is not your typical check the box training. This is an interactive course that will use audio, video and hands on exercises to ensure the everyday field officer leaves with a solid grasp of the law. In this course, officers will learn:

- Recent United States Supreme Court case law effecting both criminal and civil liability.
- Recent New Mexico case law effecting criminal and civil liability.
- Important changes in search and seizure law.
- New Mexico case law effecting how officers charge criminal cases.
- 5th and 6th Amendment case law.
- Cases specific to New Mexico law.
- New Statutes such as HB4 and The Recreational Marijuana Act.

This course will educate officers in the most important changes in federal and state law effecting policing.

Officer Liability: A Step-By-Step Guide to Understanding and Avoiding Liability (6 hours)

The constitution guarantees and federal law protects individual's "civil rights." New Mexico's constitution also provides for the same protections. With the recent passage of HB4 "The New Mexico Civil Rights Act", police officers and their public employers find themselves under intense scrutiny. Civil rights lawsuits can have a devastating effect on a law enforcement officers career and personal life. In addition, these lawsuits can result in massive settlement payouts or worse, jury verdicts against the public employer who failed to supervise or train the officer. These lawsuits can be so costly that some municipalities have had to declare bankruptcy. This is in addition to federal consent decrees and severe damage to the community the agency is sworn to protect.

Many officers avoid talking about this topic because it is confusing and uncomfortable and let's face it, officers simply do not get enough good training when it comes to the law. This NMDPS approved course will break down the law into a simple step-by-step guide on how to recognize officer liability and mitigate exposure to it. Officers will learn:

- The basics of civil rights and civil liability.
- Federal criminal liability for civil rights violations.
- The anatomy of a use of force lawsuit.
- Qualified immunity.
- Civil liability under New Mexico law.
- HB4 The New Mexico Civil Rights Act.
- The top 3 legal topics that every officer must know to limit exposure to liability.
- What administrators and municipalities can do to limit exposure to lawsuits.

Your Instructor

Erik M. Scramlin: is the owner of Tactical Legal Solutions, LLC where he provides legal training to law enforcement and prosecutors. Mr. Scramlin previously served as an Attorney-Advisor (Instructor) for Department of Homeland Security, FLETC. Prior to joining FLETC, he served as the Deputy District Attorney for the 5th Judicial District of New Mexico, Chief Deputy District Attorney for the 1st Judicial District of New Mexico, and the Deputy City Attorney for the City of Hobbs where he represented the Hobbs Police Department in civil rights claims. His awards include *New Mexico Young Prosecutor of the Year 2012*, and *New Mexico Prosecutor of the Year 2016*.

Mr. Scramlin is a member of the New Mexico State Bar. As an instructor Mr. Scramlin is a NMDPS certified instructor, federal law enforcement certified instructor and certified federal use of force law instructor.

Mr. Scramlin has trained thousands of state and federal officers in the law over his career. He brings significant experience as a prosecutor and civil rights defense attorney to all his trainings. In addition, he is obsessed with the art of teaching. His trainings are interactive and utilize multiple learning styles so that every officer leaves a course with value.

Planning and Zoning/Animal Control – Code Enforcement William Teaney told the Board that P&Z has been pretty slow lately, but Animal Control has been very busy. He has been getting a lot of calls about dogs. Many people just want to surrender their dogs to the Town, but we are telling them no because we have no place to house them. We are beginning the process of building a temporary shelter behind the P&Z building. We are going to try to reach out to the County again to get on their agenda to see if they will work with us concerning our animal control. We also do not have a working P&Z or Animal Control vehicle right now. We will work to get the vehicles fixed.

Fire- Volunteer Fire Chief Chris Wolonsky said that the ambulance is fixed and working. He will send our Maintenance Supervisor information about our fire hydrants.

Library had no written update for this meeting, but did send word that the Library's new alarm system is being installed.

12.0 Mayor/Council:

Trustee Hall said that he is very worried about the over filling of the pond. He believes it may be killing some of the nearby trees. He is excited about the idea of the Town purchasing a skid steer. Our Maintenance Supervisor needs to do some research on the different sizes.

Trustee Chavez - absent

Trustee Lovato said he had very good news to share. EMW Gas was able to lock in to a very good rate for gas for the next 3 months. He said significant savings would be coming to our residents very soon. He suggested that the Town employees receive embroidered work shirts. This is a very good idea that the Clerk will research. Trustee Lovato also said that EYDG has been a great success this year. Over 100 youth participated this year.

Trustee Sedillo congratulated Trustee Lovato on the success of the EYDG program.

Mayor Dial told the Board that the local post office had neglected to pay their water bill. Per the Town ordinance, the Post office's water was scheduled to be shut off. The Post Master spoke with the Mayor. The

American Legion paid the bill. The Mayor was at the post office with his gun on and was told he could not be in the post office with a weapon. The postal employee was in the process of calling 911 when he experienced a medical emergency. The Mayor called 911. The Estancia PD, EMS, and the Sheriff showed up at the Post Office. Now, we are trying to get clarification about whether our PD has jurisdiction at the Post Office because it is a Federal building.
